April 30, 2023 Teach Us to Pray Rev. Kelley L. Becker

Good morning! Welcome to Disciples Christian Church. I am Rev. Kelley Becker and I am so glad to be worshiping together this morning. I missed being here last week and I'm so grateful to Rev. Each week, we close our time of community prayer with what we call the Lord's Prayer. In the Gospel of Luke, Jesus' disciples ask him to teach them to pray. The author of Luke chose these words for that prayer:

"Father, may your name be revered as holy.

And do not bring us to the time of trial."

There have been many different interpretations and paraphrases of the Lord's Prayer written. In the Bible, there is another in the Gospel of Matthew. This is one of my favorites, written by Neil Douglas Klotz from his book, *Prayers of the Cosmos*.

Reflection on Prayer (Kelley) Prayer as Participation

The Rarámuri, an indigenous tribe that lives primarily in the highlands of the Sierra Madre Occidental, Mexico, have a beautiful ritual; drumming the sun up. This ritual, I've learned, is also part of indigenous people-led winter solstice celebrations in the U.S. One way to experience the ritual in Mexico is to get up very early, before the sun, and stand at the rim of the Copper Canyon in northern Mexico. Before dawn, the drumming begins faintly until the canyon itself becomes a sound chamber. If you were standing there on the rim of that canyon, you would find that your body would begin to feel the rhythm from your head to toes. And while you would not actually be drumming, you would be more than an onlooker, you would be a participant, feeling the drumming in your body.

When the drummers see the sun peek over the canyon rim, they abruptly stop drumming. The sun is up. The Rarámuri do not believe their drumming causes the sun to come up. They understand this ritual as a way of *participating* in the sunrise through this expression of gratitude for the sun on which their lives depend. Life is full of moments like these, in which we can choose to fully engage and participate in what is happening or we can choose to sort of just watch those moments pass by. One thing I know for sure, life is too short not to participate.

The prayers spoken and sung this morning have given us a choice. We can choose to listen as if we are merely onlookers, or we can engage and participate. If I am honest, I have struggled with prayer. On the one hand, I don't understand God as a sky Santa, listening to our prayers, saying yes to some and no to others. That feels very transactional to me, and I don't believe God is like that or that prayer works like that. On the other hand, I believe prayer changes things and it does so through the person praying. And that is important. Because when people change, the world changes. All of that to say, in my mind and heart, prayer is transformational and not transactional.

And it is a form of participation, whether we believe prayer causes God to do something, or the Universe to do something, or not. My experience with prayer has been that just as drumming the sun up is not why the sun rises, my prayers for health are not why my mom recovered, or prayers for justice are not why same sex couples can legally marry. Because if I believed that, I would also have to believe that my prayers for my dad's health went unheard. Or prayers to end systemic racism have been rejected. You may understand prayer differently, so please hear me when I say, that's okay. Perhaps we could agree that prayer is a mystery, and it changes things. In the end, we could all be wrong about a lot of things, theologically speaking.

I believe when we pray for other people, it grows compassion in us for their suffering and experiences. And like our muscles when we exercise them, compassion grows when we practice it. On the flip side, there is comfort in knowing that other people are praying for us as we talk to the doctor or do the scary thing we have been dreading. The prayers of other people remind us that we are not alone. When we pray for other people and when they pray for us, those prayers connect us to one another. Those connections happen when we participate in prayer and in life.

I believe the same is true when we pray for ourselves...and we should. Speaking our truth, our deepest longings, our regret, our gratitude, our joy, and our pain, into the Universe, or to the ears of God, connects us with the very heart of ourselves. As we sit with our prayers, we are reminded what is important to us and we are reminded who we really are and who we want to be. Our acts of prayer, the act of connecting with other people, the Holy, and ourselves change us.

Rev. Dawn Hutchings, a retired minister and writer for Progressive Christianity, wrote about the ways in which prayer transforms us. "...the world needs to hear from us...Prayer that opens up, moves us, connects us, empowers us, transforming us into miracle workers, the kind of miracles that will heal an ailing world...Transformative prayer opens us to the miraculous power of living in LOVing relationship with the Source of our being (whatever you think that is), so that we can live in LOVing relationship with Creation, LOVing relationship with all

whom we share this Earth [all our sisters and brothers], and LOVing relationship with our very selves. It is the power of this LOVE which will enable our prayers to help us see clearly, to pay attention, to connect, to find ways to care for our neighbors, to welcome the stranger, to seek justice, to be merciful, and to LOVE extravagantly." In these ways, dear ones, prayer has the power to change the world and regardless of what you believe about prayer, I think we can agree that what we want and hope for is a world changed for the better.

Psychologist Dr. Arden Mahlberg writes, "Prayer is a form of participation when other options are not immediately available. And, when other options are available, prayer is an additional, meaningful dimension of participation..." When we pray we open ourselves to new love and new hope, we open ourselves to new life and new possibilities, and because of that, we become the answer to our own prayers. Which makes a lot of sense if we believe there is a Divine spark within each of us. My prayer for all of us is that we will allow ourselves to participate in the miracle of each new day. Life is short. Participate. Amen.
